1750



1783: Treaty of Paris is signed, ceding the territory west of the Allegheny Mountains to the United States

1788: White settlers arrive and name the territory Losantiville

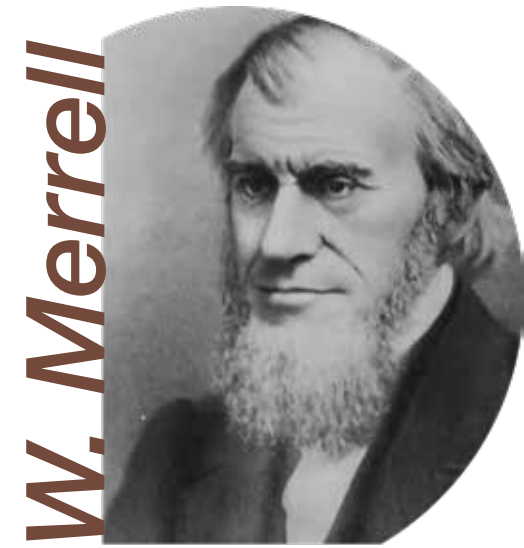
1790: Losantiville renamed to Cincinnati

1810: Pop. Increase
2,500 residents ▲

1811: The first steamboat, named New Orleans, travels the Ohio River from Pittsburgh to the city of New Orleans

1817: Joseph Jonas, Cincinnati's first Jewish immigrant to stay permanently, arrives

1820: *until 1920* - the U.S. experiences the largest wave of immigration in its history

1829: Fifth St. Market opens

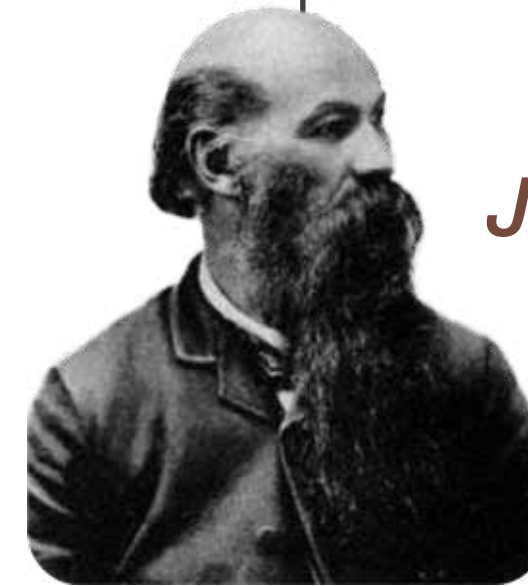
1828: William Merrell opens his pharmacy

1847: Ohio River floods Cincinnati and neighboring cities

1850: U.S. Congress enacts the Fugitive Slave Act, part of the Compromise of 1850

1855: National Women's Rights Convention convenes in Cincinnati

1870: Pop. Increase
216,000 residents ▲

1859: Cincinnati produces 8 million gallons of lager beer for consumption

1885: First dam to be constructed to control flooding of the Ohio River
